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Topic C765: Cooperation is Good Business

Introduction: On the job safety is a program of proactive participation between employers, supervisors, and employees. A foundation of job safety is the ability to exercise responsibility, good judgment, and accountability, and being able to depend on your co-workers and employer to exercise the same ability. While working on the job you are seldom alone. A workplace is often a crowded place with workers involved in seemingly hectic disunity. However, the knowledgeable employer, supervisors, and well trained workers proceed in a well-coordinated, orderly, workmanlike manner, and can readily spot an unsafe situation, condition, or act. Everyone must get involved in company safety.

Employers: It is your responsibility to provide training and a safety program for your employees.

- Management commitment Managers must be committed to making the program work.
- **Hazard identification and control** Employees know how to identify and control hazards.
- Labor and management accountability Employees are held accountable for following safe work practices.

If you are ever unsure of the correct or safe way to proceed on a job or particular task, ask your supervisor, or make it your responsibility to gain proper training.

- Incident and accident investigations Supervisors know how to investigate near-miss incidents and accidents.
- Employee involvement Get your employees involved in the program.
- Worker training Employees and managers are educated and trained in safe work practices.
- Enforcement of the program Supervisors must be committed to the program and when needed, discipline the offending personnel.
- Periodic evaluations of the program Managers review the program regularly.

Employees: It is your responsibility to follow your company's safety program and to conduct yourselves in a workmanlike manner. It is also your responsibility to see to your co-workers safety.

- Let your fellow workers, or anyone who may be endangered on the job, know of any hazards you know or believe to
 exist
- Let your co-worker or anyone at the workplace know if you think they are committing an unsafe act or work practice.
- **Report** hazards to a supervisor or safety committee member promptly.
- Keep tools and equipment working properly; follow periodic maintenance schedules and safe work procedures.
- You've planned and prepared for emergencies. Know what to do when something goes wrong.
- Employees know what workplace hazards could harm them, and respond promptly to eliminate or control workplace hazards.
- Learn first aid skills and how to respond to common injuries and illnesses.
- Actively participate in the training of new workers to ensure their proper training and to help them understand your crew's work procedures
- If you are ever unsure of the correct or safe way to proceed on a job or particular task, ask your supervisor, or make it your responsibility to gain proper training.

Conclusion: No one wants to see a fellow worker injured on the job. It is the responsibility of everyone in the workplace to not only look out for themselves, but also look out for the other guy.
